Snyder-Mackler wins Francis Alison Award, UD's top faculty honor

Lynn Snyder-Mackler, husband to Harlam alum Scott (Scott was the Camp doctor from 1992 through 1999), and mother to Harlam alums Alex and Noah, received the University of Delaware's highest faculty honor: The Francis Allison Faculty Award. You can read the article written about Lynn below. Mazel Tov, Lynn!

May 11, 2009---Lynn Snyder-Mackler, Alumni Distinguished Professor of Physical Therapy, is the 2009 recipient of the Francis Alison Faculty Award -- the University of Delaware's highest faculty honor.

Established by the Board of Trustees in 1978, the award consists of a \$10,000 prize and confers membership in the Alison Society. Snyder-Mackler is the first faculty member in the College of Health Sciences to win the honor and the third woman among the 29 recipients of the award to date.

The Alison Award is bestowed annually to the faculty member who best characterizes "the scholar-schoolmaster," as exemplified by the Rev. Dr. Francis Alison, who in 1743, founded the institution that is now the University of Delaware. His first class of students became distinguished statesmen, doctors, merchants, and scholars. Three signed the Declaration of Independence and one signed the U.S. Constitution.

Jason Mesches

What years were you at camp and in what capacity?

I was at camp from 1995 - 2006. Started in Carmel Boys 1 (the first "non village" Carmel) CIT 2003 and was on staff in Galil, Kfar and Chavurah 2004-06.

What do you do now?

I'm an actor living in La.

How did you choose this line of work and what made you pick up and move out west?

I have wanted to be an actor or entertainer in some capacity since I was a very young child. I was brought up just outside of NYC so I was surrounded by the sights and sounds of the Broadway stage. However, once I realized that I wanted to make the jump from stage to screen, I packed my bags (with my best friend from camp) and we drove across the country to chase the dream in Hollywood.

How was the transition from east coast to California?

Easier than I thought. Although, I would be lying if I said that I didn't miss the seasons - and the cold weather. Out here we live in a Matt Stamm nightmare where it really does feel like summertime forever.

If you could have any color war theme what would it be?

This is a question that cuts deep to the core of me. My whole camp career I dreamt of a day where I'd see "Rugrats" as the theme. Blue Tommy, Red Chuckie, Green Phil & Lil, and Gold Angelica. Captain Spike (or if there were two captains - Captains Stu and Didi). But, by the time I became a general in 2006 the theme was SO dated that we feared the campers would not understand it.

If you could build one structure in camp, what would you build?

Two words: mini golf. Where you ask? On the boys tennis courts. I'd even work at camp for a summer if they built it. In that grand tradition of naming people in camp after the job they have, clearly I would be Mini Golf Mesch.

Which camp meal was the best? Pierogies, grilled cheese, pizza, or something else?

I was always a sucker for yellow meal. (and I don't think this has happened for a long while, but we used to get Mallowmars on the regular for milk squad back in Sharon, and that was AWESOME).

I did. I was never good at it. However, a guy my year named Brian Umansky sticks out in my mind as a legendary eater of the fried camp delicacy.

There is no doubt in my mind that camp has shaped so much about who I am. Camp has played a major role in my Jewish life, social life and my career. My closest friends in the world to this day are my camp friends. In fact, when I first made the move to Hollywood I called my old CIT and said, "Hey Shappy, I don't know if you remember me, but I was one of your campers and I'm here in LA now. I'd love to get

together and talk about life in Hollywood." - and like we never left that filthy Sharon bunk, he invited me over. Also, I'm pretty sure I wouldn't be an actor today if it weren't for my fine training and work in Joseph and Betty Harlam's productions of Really Rosie, Oliver, Charlie Brown, etc. Truly Tony Award winning performances.

What advice would you give someone wanting to pick up and move out west to act, produce, etc...?

You gotta go with your gut and follow your dream. If you want to be an actor, train hard, take some classes, save up some money, and move on out. That being said, if you can see yourself doing ANY OTHER JOB, I promise it'll probably be easier to break into.

Frisbee golf or shoe golf?

Shoe golf. Straight up.

Chapel on the Hill or Chapel in the Woods?

I was always partial to the rare Saturday morning on the hill. (usually this occurred when it has rained the night before, but the benches on the hill got enough sun to dry up - and anything beat having services in the beit).
